WHY FOREIGN LANGUAGES

- ❑ Foreign Trade – Effective Communication
- ❑ Liberalization – Open Economy followed by Globalization
- ❑ Recognized by UNO, WTO, European Union, Trade Blocks and various other International Trade forums
- ❑ While learning one learns not only communication but also – Culture, history, ethnic values, practices of the society which are equally important for effective communication
- ❑ Research says one Increases analytical abilities
- ❑ Global Advantage – foreign companies feel more comfortable with counterpart speaking the same language – That is how even in BPO's Foreign language speaking executives are given high and better openings

WHY FOREIGN LANGUAGES

- ❑ One knows exotic Americas, Fashioned France and Arabic and French mixed Africa, Robust Germany, Russian Vodka or any other unknown world – about whom one has just read in text books – Here you visualize them
- ❑ While Travelling you do not have to depend on Interpreter, same thing applies during business talks
- ❑ Those desirous of becoming socialite world should have command over a foreign Language – Make friends – boys, girls
- ❑ Most of the research surveyed prove that average earners with linguistic abilities are paid 12% higher than their counterpart with no or little linguistic abilities.
- ❑ Many companies abroad need his employee to speak native language

SOME EXPERIENCES ABROAD

- A February 1997 article in *Time magazine* suggested that foreign languages should be taught to children as early as possible. The American Council on Education, in a 1989 policy statement, calls on higher education leaders "to make foreign language competence an integral part of a college education. Every baccalaureate holder should be competent in a second language; we can settle for no less as we move into the next century

SOME EXPERIENCES ABROAD

- On September 15, 1999, Secretary of Education Richard W. Riley delivered his Annual Back-to-School Address, entitled, "Changing the American High School to Fit Modern Times." Included in his remarks, Riley states, "Let me suggest one other way to raise standards. I believe that in this new economy every high school student should be close to fluent in a foreign language when he or she graduates. We should begin teaching foreign languages in our elementary schools, and then in middle schools and high schools. English is a beautiful language and every American student must be a master of it. English is surely a world language. But learning a foreign language exposes young people to new cultures and new horizons and helps them understand English better."

SOME EXPERIENCES ABROAD

- Brain science has discovered that functional plasticity of the human brain is driven by language, and it is beginning to find out that knowing a foreign language can actually change the brain's anatomy by adding gray matter. Dr. Andrea Mechelli is a well-known researcher at the Institute for Cognitive Neuroscience at University College London. Aided by experts from the Fondazione Santa Lucia in Rome, he recently completed research showing that brain density is effected by being bilingual or highly proficient in a second language. WebMD tells this story in a recent article:

SOME EXPERIENCES WITHIN INDIA

Modern India as a whole is multilingual.

Linguistically India, with its States and Union Territories, is made of many mini-Indias. Those who are multilingual constitute some 20 % of the total population.

The traditionally strong constituent of multilingual groups is further strengthened in modern times from one decade to another, by increasing mobility within the country as well as the introduction of formal education in all parts of the country which makes it obligatory to learn at least two languages until the end of higher secondary education.

SOME EXPERIENCES WITHIN INDIA

- ❑ The number of bilinguals is on the increase from Census to Census.
- ❑ Their national average is:
1961- 9.70%; 1971- 13.04%; 1981-13.34%; 1991- 19.44%.
- ❑ Some important results, in the case of the major languages, emerging from the 1991 Census are as follows:
- ❑ 18.72% are bilinguals and 7.22% are trilinguals and the bilinguals among minor languages are 38.14% and the trilinguals are 8.28%.
- ❑ Significantly, among major language speakers, the spread of bilingualism in English is more (than in Hindi)
- ❑ 8% as second language, 3.15% as third language whereas the same in Hindi is 6.15% and 2.16%.

SOME EXPERIENCES WITHIN INDIA

- The Constitution of India listed fourteen languages (Assamese, Bengali, Gujarati, Hindi, Kannada, Kashmiri, Malayalam, Marathi, Oriya, Punjabi, Sanskrit, Tamil, Telugu, and Urdu) into its Eighth Schedule in 1950. Since then, this has been expanded thrice, once to include Sindhi, at another to include Konkani, Manipuri and Nepali, and just this month to include Bodo, Santhali, Maithili and Dogri. The 100th Constitution Amendment which added the latter four languages into the Eighth Schedule was supported by all the 338 members present in the Parliament. It has been stated that claims of 33 more languages for inclusion are under

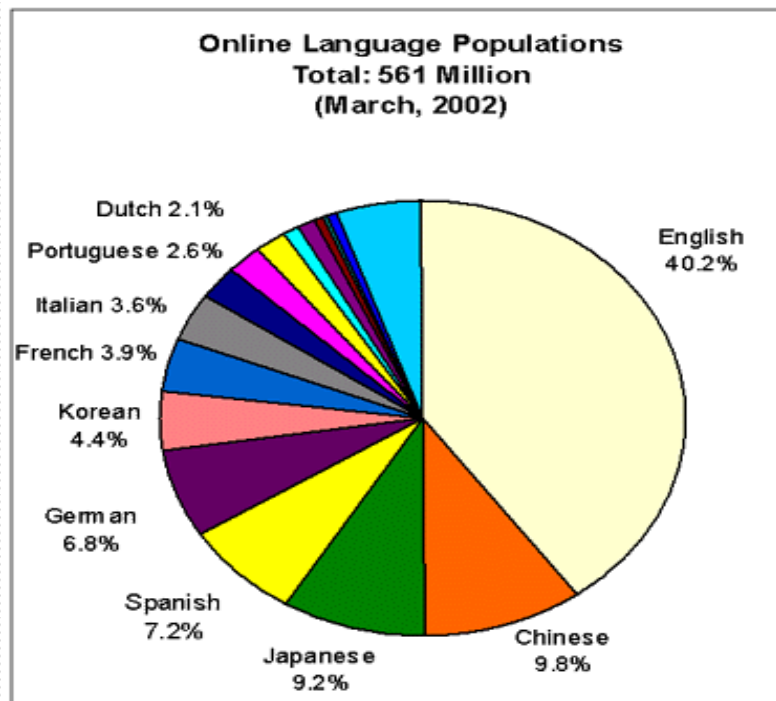
- It is worth mentioning the encouraging reports by UNESCO that has appreciated India's stand " on maintaining linguistic diversity" ... (when) about half of the approximately 6000 languages spoken in the world are under threat, seriously endangered or dying," it does appreciate that "India has maintained its extensive and well-catalogued linguistic diversity".

SOME FACTS ABOUT SPANISH

- ❑ In 1999, Spanish had 332 million speakers, while English had 322 million. [Ethnologue](#).
- ❑ **Current Figure shows that Spanish has 450 million speakers.**
- ❑ Spanish is official language of 21 countries including Argentina, Belize, Bolivia, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Mexico, Nicaragua, Panama, Paraguay, Peru, the Philippines, Puerto Rico, Uruguay and Venezuela.
- ❑ Approximately another 100 million people speak Spanish as second Language
- ❑ **As of 1998, the United States has the fifth largest Hispanic population, about 30 million people Two-thirds trace their roots to Mexico, and 86 percent say Spanish is their first language.**
- ❑ During the sweeps period earlier last year, the top local TV newscast in the New York City area was *Noticias 41*, a Spanish-language broadcast. And *Noticiero Univision*, the newscast of a national Spanish-language network, beat out the big three network news shows.
- ❑ **California alone has 5.5 million people who speaks Spanish at home. Other states with high Spanish-speaking populations include Texas (3.4 million), New York (1.8 million), and Florida (1.5 million).**
- ❑ About 7.2 percent of the people who use the Internet speak Spanish, making it the No. 4 language in the Internet community, following English (40.2 percent), Chinese (9.8 percent), Japanese (9.2 percent) German (6.8 percent). Close behind is, Korean with 4.8 percent, followed by French with 3.9 percent.
- ❑ A recent study of 25 metro markets in the United States found that Spanish-language programming was the sixth most popular format.
- ❑ **Because the birth rate in the Spanish-speaking world is higher than among people whose first language is English, Spanish can be expected to remain firmly in the No. 2 spot for years to come. And if the economies of Latin American countries improve, Spanish could gain importance in worldwide trade and communications as well.**

SOME FACTS ABOUT FRENCH

- ❑ French is the eleventh most widely-spoken language in the world.
- ❑ **French is the mother tongue of 75 million people.**
- ❑ **200 million people around the world understand, speak, read or write French.**
- ❑ Along with English, French is the official working language of the United Nations, UNESCO, NATO, the Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD), the International Monetary Fund, the International Labour Bureau, and the International Olympic Committee.
- ❑ French is the dominant working language at the European Court of Justice, the European Tribunal of First Instance, the European Court of Auditors in Luxembourg, and the Press Room at the European Commission in Brussels.
- ❑ French-speaking Africa represents an area larger than the USA.
- ❑ **French is the most widely taught second language after English.**
- ❑ Over 20,000 English words have their origins in French.
- ❑ In the humanities and the social sciences many of the most important writings have come from France. Students and researchers who know French have access to these works for several years before they are translated into English. Many significant works are never translated and remain accessible only to those who know the language.
- ❑ France is one of the world's major foreign tourist destinations (60 million tourists a year).
- ❑ France has the fourth largest economy in the world after the U.S., Japan and Germany.
- ❑ **France is the fourth largest producer of automobiles in the world (Renault, Peugeot, Citroën) and the third largest exporter.**

SOME FACTS ABOUT GERMAN LANGUAGE

- ❑ Today German is spoken by more than 100 million people.
- ❑ German is the most widely spoken native language in the EU.
- ❑ **Germany boasts a 99% literacy rate.**
- ❑ German belongs to the three most learned languages in the world as well as the ten most widely spoken languages in the world.
- ❑ **German is among the top five most widely used languages on the Internet.**
- ❑ One fourth of the tourists in the U.S. are German speaking.
- ❑ Germany is the second most popular European destination for American tourists.
- ❑ **German is the official language in seven countries (Germany, Austria, Switzerland, Liechtenstein, Luxemburg, as well as parts of Italy and Belgium).**
- ❑ With 22 %, German-Americans represent the largest ethnic group in America today (according to the 1990 Census). Some prominent examples include Albert Einstein, Levi Strauss, Henry Kissinger, and Werner von Braun.

- ⑩ EEPIC, FIEO, CII, ITPO, ESC and other trade promotion bodies in India keep on organizing a lot of seminars & shows along with the Spanish Government. These events require many Spanish Speaking local persons to effectively coordinate & run the show, ie. Event Management.
- ⑩ Many Colleges, MBA institutes and Universities have began Spanish language courses, and they offer quite lucrative and stable job opportunities for those who have achieved academic excellence in this particular language.
- ⑩ While taking admission, many US as well as European universities offer ample percentage of weightage to those who have basic as well as advance level of knowledge and understanding in Spanish Language.
- ⑩ IT enabled services i.e. Call centers are growing at a steady pace. India is becoming the hub for most of the call centers, medical transcription etc. To provide such services to Spanish speaking countries, India will need a pool of fluent Spanish speaking work force .

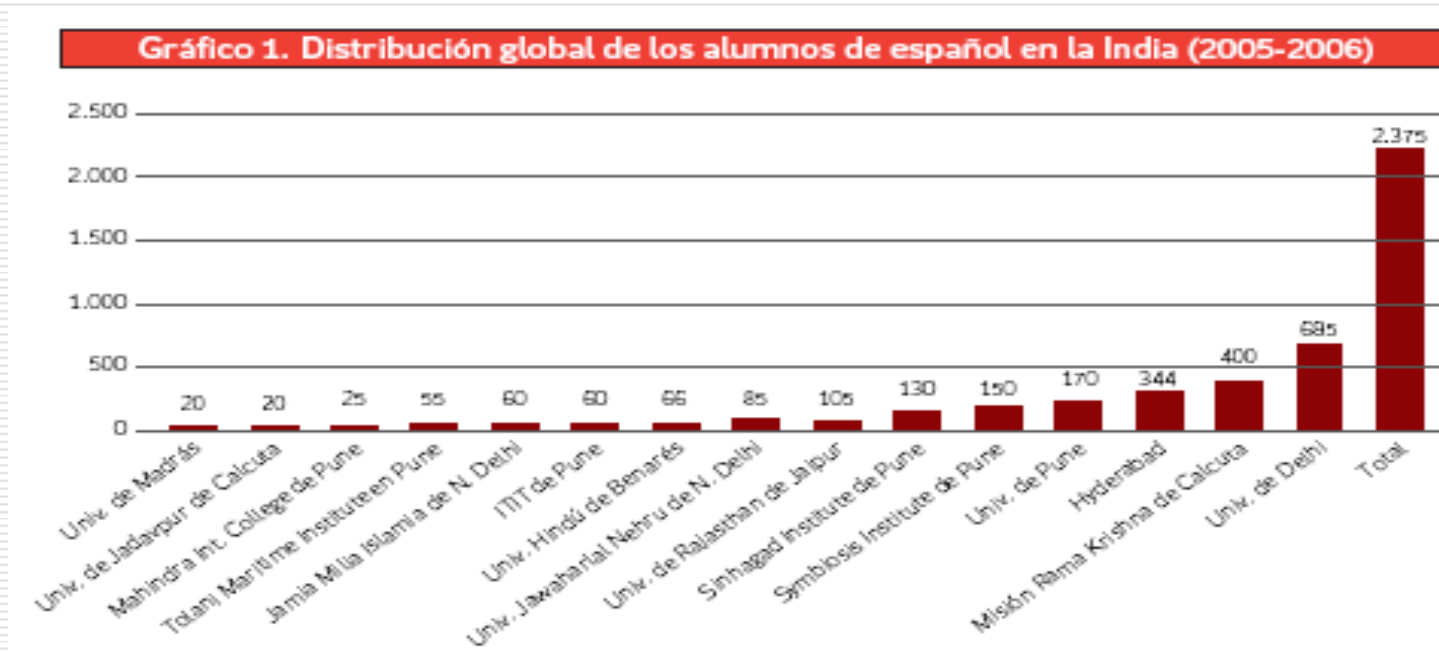

SCENARIO OF SPANISH IN INDIA

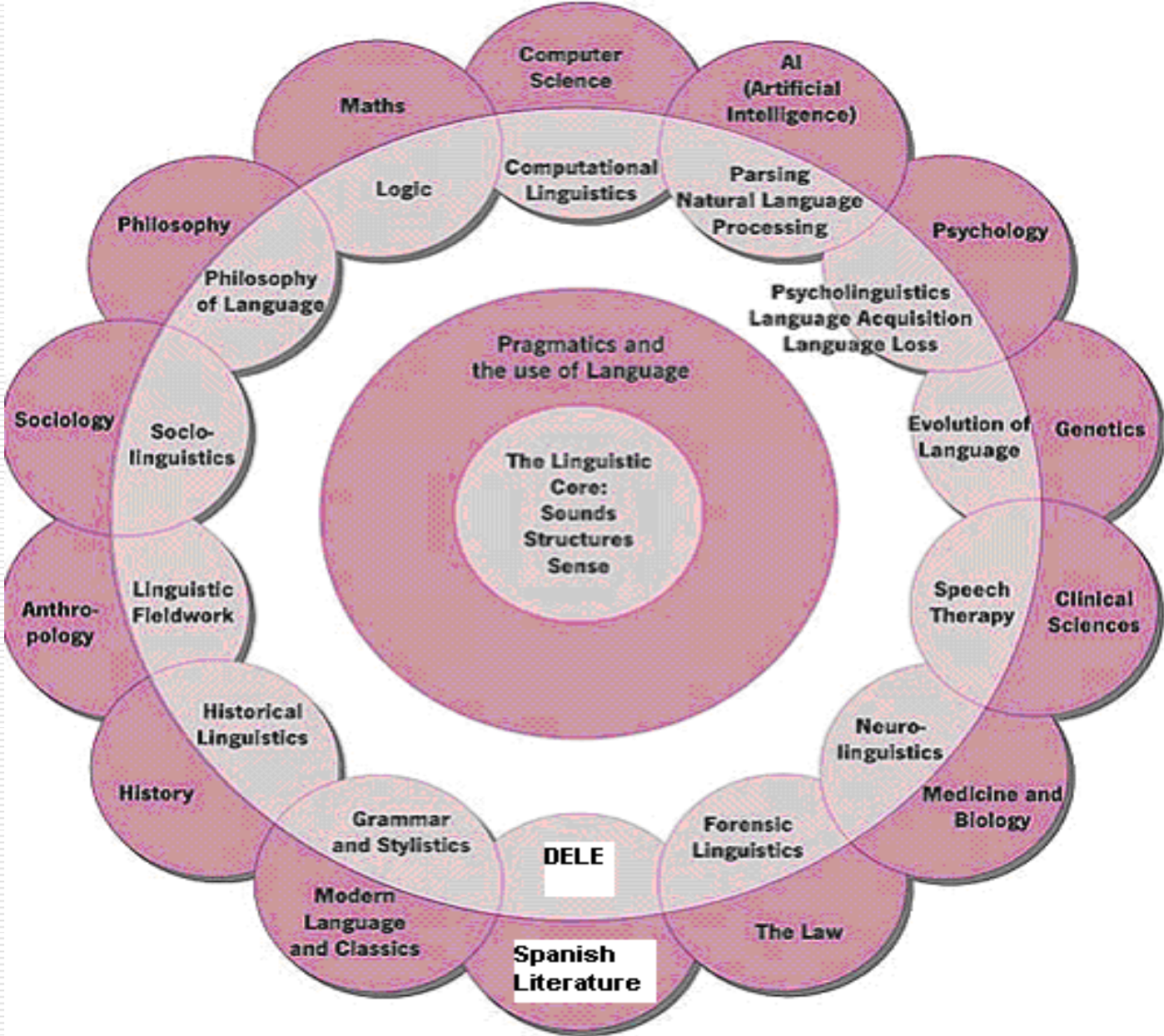
